Matt Kean became the youngest Member of the New South Wales Parliament at the age of 28. He is the representative for the Hornsby Shire area, which includes Berowra.

He is also the NSW Minister for Energy and Environment. Every year, Mr Kean comes to our Presentation Day, to present the Matt Kean Visual Arts Award.

There's actually quite a funny story as to why Mr Kean presents the Visual Arts Award every year. In 2011 Matt Kean offered to donate an award to the school, he was told that we already had a Citizenship Award and was asked if he could donate a Visual Arts Award instead. Unfortunately, Mr Kean, who trained as an accountant, knows nothing about art, so he found this pretty funny.

Mr Kean has many hobbies that he enjoys, some he has had since childhood. One of them is sport, he loves his cricket and has been playing for Berowra since he was a child, he also loves Rugby League, and was a supporter of the North Sydney Bears before they were taken out of the competition. As well as loving sport, he really enjoys reading and reads a lot of the time. On top of all of that, he loves cooking, in fact he recently did a cooking course, because his wife was refusing to cook anymore meaning they would starve, but after the course, he found he loved cooking!

Matt Kean, being a member of Parliament has two different roles. As the representative for the Hornsby Shire he has to stand up for our community, meaning that when there's a problem with a public place around the area, for example bad school facilities or terrible public toilets, he has to listen to our complaints, and make sure they're heard. As the Minister for Energy and Environment, he has to make sure that the environment isn't destroyed by big developers who want more property to sell. He also has the job of transitioning NSW from fossil fuel, to renewable energy such as solar, wind and hydro (water) power. Last week Mr Kean was able to announce a huge addition to the Australian National Parks. 

Best Anzac Cookies

Why I like it? They are the best Anzac cookies ever! They have a nice caramelized outside and a soft inside.

This Recipe makes 16

Ingredients

- 125g butter
- 2 tablespoons of golden syrup
- 1 cup of brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons of boiling water
- ³/₄ cup of desiccated coconut
- 1 cup of rolled oats (not quick oats)
- 1 cup of plain flour
- ¹/₂ teaspoon of baking soda

Read all of the method before starting

Method

Put the butter and golden syrup in a pan on the stove on medium low heat until the butter is melted. Then put all of the other ingredients in the mix in this order: flour, coconut, sugar, oats, baking soda. Then add water. Make sure you mix each of the ingredients as you put them in. If the mixture is crumbly add more water until wet. Get 2 trays and place 8 on each tray. Cook in the oven at 180°C between 12 and 14 minutes.
