Why Play a Musical Instrument?

Music affects the brain in many positive ways. It makes you smarter, happier and more productive at any age. Listening is good, playing is even better.

Playing music in an ensemble not only encourages team work but is scientifically proven to help improve brain function. Children with musical training are shown to do better in subjects like language, reading, and maths and have better fine motor skills than their non-musical classmates. Not only this but it's great fun!

Learning a Musical Instrument at Berowra

Students who would like to join the **Band Program** are required to have an instrumental lesson each week. The *Music Program* can provide a list of teachers in the area that parents can contact to organise weekly lessons.

Weekly instrumental lessons provide students with the skills they will need to play in an ensemble, teachers give practical lessons, teaching children how to read music, the fingerings for the particular instrument. Band/ensemble music can be taken to lessons to work on with teachers. Learning to play a musical instrument is great fun but it isn't always easy. Regular tuition and private practice are both key ingredients for success.

Music Fees

Unfortunately, primary school music programs are not supported financially by the Department of Education. Music fees cover the cost of paying our Conductors and also help with the cost of sheet music, equipment and administration. BPS Music Committee is a non-profit organisation and every effort is made to keep band fees as low as possible. Music fees are payable twice a year, Term 1 & Term 3, this reduces administration for our volunteer Treasurer. Fees are paid each Semester (Term 1 & Term 3)

KISS AND RIDE ZONES

<u>Kiss and Ride Zones</u> are for your child's safety, your convenience and to reduce congestion and confusion

Kiss and Ride rules

- Kiss and Ride zones and "No Parking" operate under the same conditions
- Drivers may stop to drop off or pick up children for a maximum of 2 minutes
- Drivers must remain in or within 3 metres of their vehicle

 Zone applies only during hours of operation
MINIMUM PENALTY \$177 & 2 DEMERIT POINTS





Remember:

Do not leave your vehicle

To assist with traffic flow, drivers should remain in the car whilst children get in and out. Children should travel with bags in the car and not the boot

Child Safety

Ensure children get in or out of the vehicle on the kerb side. The back seat is the safest seat for children to travel in, regardless of the make of your vehicle. Ensure children have their restraints securely fastened before driving off

No U-Turns

Do not do U-Turns in busy and congested school zones. It's dangerous and places young children at serious risk

Don't cut the queue

Don't push in the queue. Drop off or pick up your child close to the top of the zones allowing vehicles following you to enter the zone in an orderly manner

Kiss and Ride Zones need cooperation to remain effective and safe. Please drive carefully around our schools and protect all children.



Children must exit the car from the safety door - the rear footpath-side door. It is unsafe to allow children to jump out of the car into the path of oncoming traffic.



SCHOOL ZONE PARKING OFFENCES

Increased penalties for School Zones. Current as at 1 July 2016



Means that in the area in the direction of the arrow, you must NOT STOP your vehicle at any point on the road or kerb, unless there is a medical or other emergency.

BUS

ZONE

Means that you have no more than 2 minutes for drop-offs or pick-ups of passengers or goods and the driver must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.

Means that in the direction of the arrow or arrows you are not allowed to stop your vehicle unless you are driving a bus. Points Penalty \$180

Maximum Penalty

+ 2 Demerit

+ 2 Demerit Points

Penalty \$325 + 2 Demerit Points

DOUBLE PARKING

You are **NOT PERMITTED** to stop or park your vehicle alongside another vehicle that is already parked parallel to the kerb. Penalty \$325 + 2 Demerit Points

- STOP in a NO STOPPING zone: \$325 + 2 Demerit Points, or STOP on or near a Children's or Pedestrian Crossing: \$433 + 2 Demerit Points
- STOP on path/strip in built up area: \$180 + 2 Demerit Points
- STOP or Park in a Disabled Marked Area without a permit: \$541

<u>Please Note</u>: fines subject to change without notice. Current to 30 June 2017. These penalties apply to offences in school zones during posted school hours.



School Travel Update 2017 Applications

School Student Transport Scheme Applications open 10 October 2016

From Monday 10 October 2016 parents, guardians and students over 16 years, will be able to apply for 2017 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel pass by visiting <u>www.transportnsw.info/school-students</u>

Information for parents and students

School travel passes only need to be updated when a student:

- changes address, or
- changes school or campus.

A new application is required when:

- applying for an SSTS pass for the first time,
- enrolling in Kindergarten,
- progressing from Year 2 to Year 3,
- progressing from Year 6 to Year 7, or
- requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation.

Passes for 2017 travel

Opal network: Please remind ALL students to keep their School Opal cards for travel in 2017. These cards will be automatically deactivated for school holidays and then reactivated for school travel in term one. Current School Opal cards can be updated with changes of school, home address or operator.

Rural and regional travel: Student's travelling with operator issued passes will receive a new pass in the new school year.





What is a School or Child/Youth Opal Card?

The School Opal card is a free travel or discounted travel Opal card to help eligible students to get to and from school. It is only valid for approved travel on school days between your home and

school with restricted hours, on the mode(s) specified in the original application.

For travel outside of school, for personal travel or if ineligible for a School Opal card, students should use a **Child/Youth Opal card**, a concession fare Opal card for customers aged 4/15 (inclusive), or customers 16 years or older who hold a NSW/ACT Senior Secondary School Concession Card. The card must have **sufficient balance** on it for the intended travel.

Tap on and off, every time to validate your trip

At the start of each trip, tap on by placing your Opal card on an Opal card reader located at the entrance of the bus.

At the end of the trip, tap off by placing your Opal card on an Opal reader again.

Opal card holders **must always tap on and off for each trip and each transport mode** used during their journey.

If an error message displays when tapping on or off, students must take notes of the error code and contact Opal Customer Care for assistance.

No tap on and off, no bus services

Although some might have a free pass, **all students must tap on and tap off**, so we understand customer travel patterns and can adjust the services provided if necessary.

If students don't tap on and off, services may be withdrawn due to the lack of recorded patronage, or redirected to other schools where the demand is higher.

Any lost, stolen, faulty or damaged Opal card must be **reported online immediately**. While waiting for a replacement card, students must use a Child/Youth Opal card to travel.
