- All students want purple in the uniform
- Want sports like material
- Don't want shirts that need to be tucked in – polo shirts!
- Sports shirts the same for everyone – in a Berowra purple design – more modern than the old fashioned 'house' shirts.
- Girls can't be mobile in the uniform.

The overwhelming points that have come from this discussion, I feel, is the fact that in this day and age we are still dressing the students in the same uniforms that we all wore many years ago. 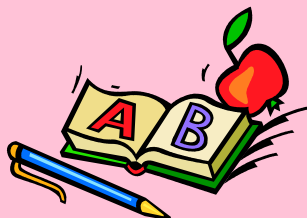
ENROL NOW FOR KINDERGARTEN 2017
