Well done boys, we are proud of your achievements.



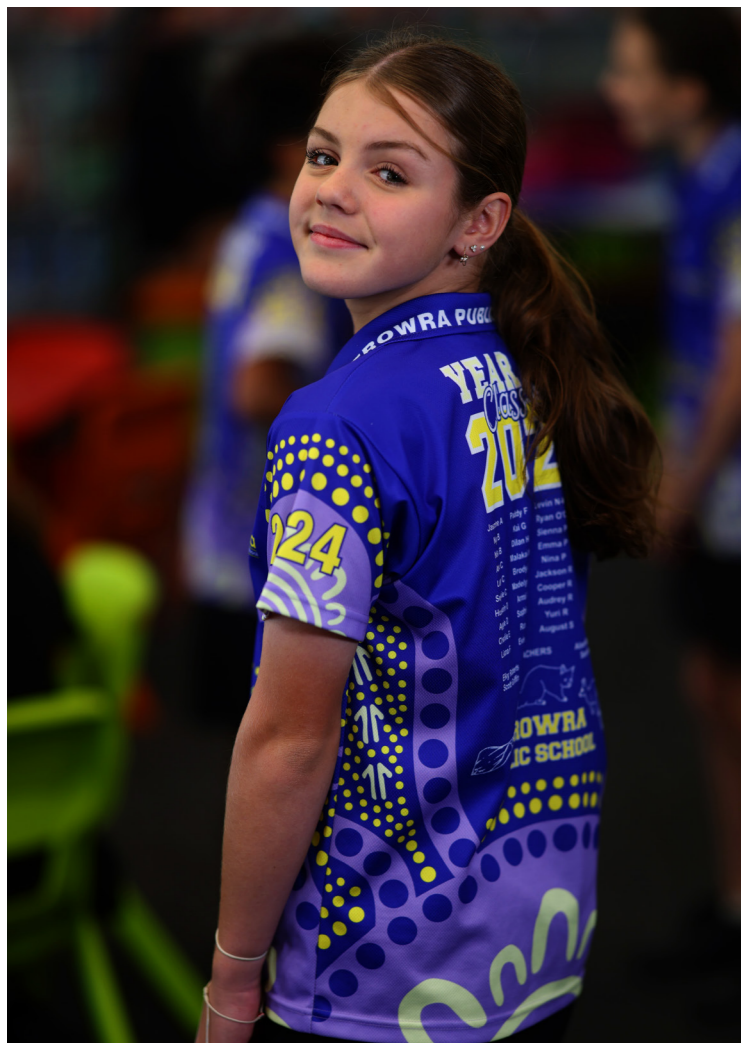
Term 2 P&C disco

FESTIVAL OF INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC PERFORMANCE AT THE OPERA HOUSE

On Thursday 27th June I arrived at the school wearing the Festival of Instrumental Music (FOIM) t-shirt featuring a cute toucan, black pants and shoes, and together with the rest of the recorder ensemble and our teachers headed off on the train. Arriving at Circular Quay, we found a sun lit patch of grass where we set our bags down and played tag, took photos and ate lunch. We were so lucky our kind teacher Nazli Bodagahl and Mrs Dewar had brought a few small cakes for my birthday! The whole ensemble was with us, Imogen and Sofia S., Robert and Cindy M., Leo S., Gus G., Emily P., Xander D.-S., Fox W., Hayley C. and me, Emilia P.

The rehearsal for the FOIM Mimosa concert went for 3 hours. We separated - descants in upper seating and tenors and trebles in lower seating. It was amazing to hear 600 recorders playing together, accompanied by over 200 strings for some songs. The organ in the Opera House Concert Hall that accompanied us had over 10,000

pipes, it is on its own level because it's way too big for the stage!

After the rehearsal we met up with our families outside the Opera House steps until concert time. I had ice cream and then dinner and enjoyed the harbour views until it was time to meet back up to perform! Our concert, Mimosa, was the 4th and final night of the concerts. The stage was dark while the audience filed in, and then the lights came up in the Concert Hall and it was time to play! My favourite piece the recorders played in was In The Serpentine Mine composed by Damian Lane. My favourite other piece was performed by a year 8 student Violette Hayward from Nambucca Heads High School singing Zero Gravity by Kate Miller-Heidke. All of the songs sounded amazing and my conductor was wearing a beautiful, sparkly sequin dress, reflecting in all the camera flashes. It was amazing to be not in the audience, but in a musician's seat. I highly recommend this experience for anyone who has spare time and could put in effort to perform at this musical sensation!!

To ensure the success of the Fair, we need your support. We are reaching out to ask for your help in the following ways:

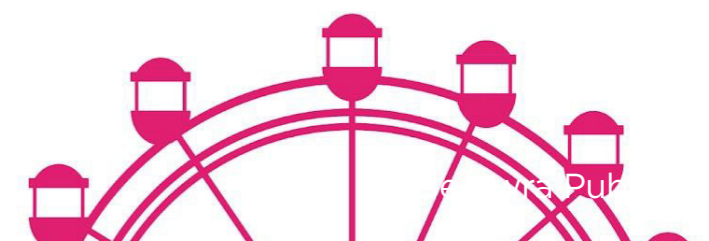
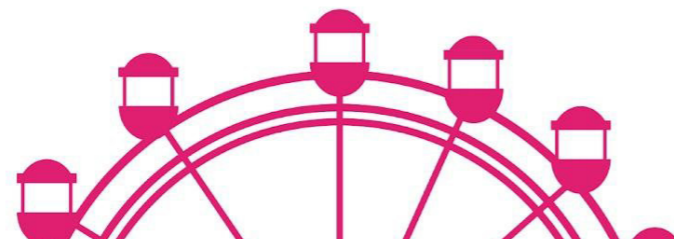
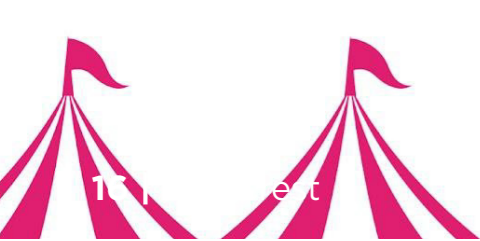
- 1. Running a Class Stall:** Each class will be responsible for running a stall at the fair. We need volunteers to help set up, manage and run the stall on the day.

The NSW Premier's Reading Challenge is now open and Berowra Public School is excited to be participating!

What is the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge?

The PRC is a statewide Challenge that encourages students to develop a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students and enables them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition, but a challenge to encourage each student to read, to read more, and to read more widely.

All students who complete the challenge and have their reading record validated by the school's PRC coordinator will receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW.

How many books do students need to read?

Students in Kindergarten to Year 2 are challenged to read or experience 30 books. 20 of these books must be from the relevant Challenge booklists, and up to 10 books can be personal choice books. Books can be read with a parent, carer, teacher or another student.

Students in Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 20 books independently. At least 10 of these books must be from the relevant Challenge booklists, and up to 10 books can be personal choice books.

If a book is from an approved PRC series, students can enter up to 5 books as Challenge books and can read up to 10 other books from the same series as Personal Choice books. More information on the rules of the Challenge can be found on the PRC website.

Books must be added to a student's online reading record by **Friday 23 August 2024** in order for their reading record to be validated and receive a certificate.

How do students log their reading?

Students can access the PRC's [Student Experience site](#) using their DoE username and password, or can log into the site via the Student Portal. A video guide explaining how to use the Student Experience site can be found [here](#).

How can students find books on the NSW PRC challenge lists?

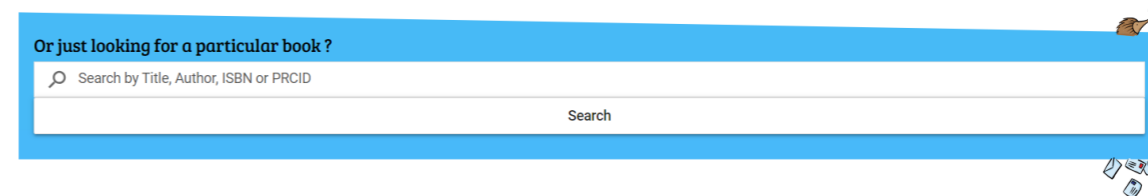
In the library students have access to a folder with printed lists. PRC books have coloured stickers on their spines **K-2 red 3-4 green 5-6 purple** Students are familiar with these stickers and where to find these books so they can borrow and read them.

BPS had record numbers completing the PRC last year. We would love to increase that number again this year and ask parents to encourage their children to participate. Once completed students will have their names displayed in our library on our PRC display and will receive a certificate of achievement at the end of the year. Together we can promote the benefits of reading for enjoyment and encourage our students to create a love of reading.

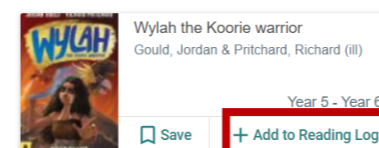

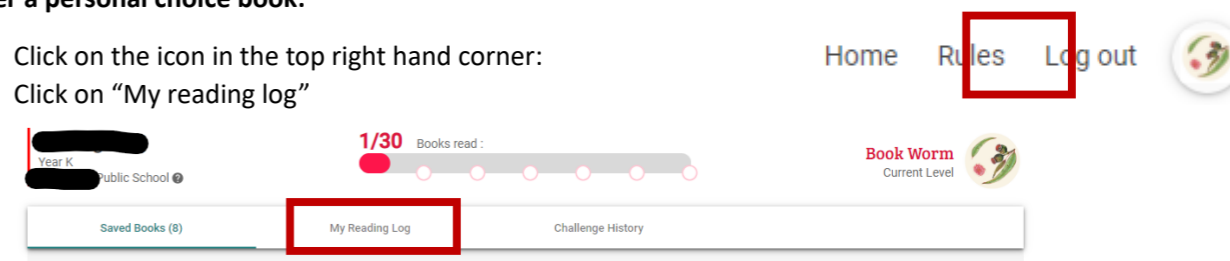

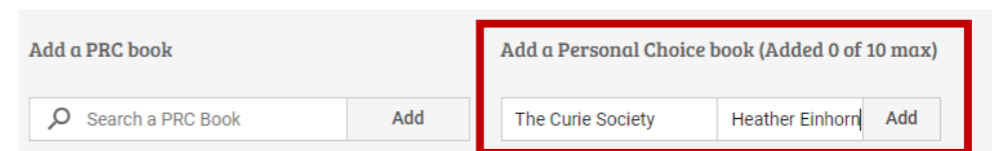
