
Rachel very generously gave up her time and resources to come in and facilitate some fun and engaging art lessons across K-6.

Everything was black and we found our places. Suddenly the music started! We danced our hearts out and took in every moment of it.







BRINGING STUDENTS TOGETHER -ONE PIECE AT A TIME TUESDAYS AT LUNCHTIME Speed Puzzling is becoming more and more popular around the world and lots of countries run state and national championships where individuals, pairs and teams of 4 race to complete a 500 piece puzzle in the fastest time possible.

kife as a teacher begins the day you realise you are always a learner.

his year, Mrs Stephens, Mr Leary, Mrs Beckedahl and Mrs Boon have been part of a Mooney Mooney Education Network project around Explicit Teaching, working with our Director Adam Boulous, Curriculum Specialists from the Department and a range of schools from across the network. With the implementation of our new English and Mathematics curriculum, this was a great opportunity to support all of the teachers at BPS in building their knowledge.

As a school team, we developed a theory of action to help us have a clear vision of our content focus - spelling - and our explicit teaching focus - connecting learning. We have also been able to plan ongoing and relevant professional learning for teachers to support the work they are doing in classrooms.

Spelling is often a skill that students do well when they are in a spelling lesson, but it does not always transfer into writing they might be doing at other times. It has clear links with building vocabulary (knowledge we need to be good at comprehending what we read) and has specific patterns and generalisations that we can use to become better spellers.

As part of the project, stage teams have used Teaching Sprints to focus on a very specific spelling skill in their day to day teaching over 2-3 weeks. The teachers have worked with Mrs Boon to identify a target based on classroom data and observation, learned more about the best ways to teach that skill and then gone into their classrooms to teach the planned lessons.

• Kindergarten – adding 's' to make a word a plural


• Stage 1 - doubling the last consonant to add 'ed' or 'ing' endings e.g. stop becomes stopping

• Stage 2 - change 'y' to 'i' before adding 'es' in a plural

• Stage 3 – generalisations for making plurals by adding 's' or 'es'

Across the school we discussed the consistent terminology we would use to teach these lessons so that students are always building on their prior knowledge as they learn new spelling skills. Terms like base word, suffix, short vowel and consonant are now very familiar to our students.

After the 2-3 weeks of teaching, teachers checked in to see how students had progressed and shared their Sprint Stories with the rest of the staff. In all Stages we saw significant



improvement in students applying what they had learned and planned for monitoring how these skills transfer across all of their work.

Our Sprints have helped us not only focus on very specific skills that our students need, but also to refine the best ways to teach them. We are all looking forward to the next round of Sprints and the project team are very keen to share our success with the Network group in November.



We look forward to showcasing this artwork as a proud symbol of our shared respect for Aboriginal culture and history.

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
